# Your 2023 Committee




The picture below is misleading as your committee meets on 'Zoom' these days!

At the recent AGM - our 50<sup>th</sup> - all committee members were returned for a further year of service to the Association. However, Melvyn Essen had reached the end of his 2-year term of office as President and was succeeded by Christine Stevens (Chichester). Christine, who has given decades of service to WSBKA, thanked Melvyn for his past service.

Other committee members elected for 2023: - Chair, Roger Patterson (Wisborough Green); Treasurer, Brian Hose (Chichester); Secretary, Graham

Elliott (Chichester) and Vice-Chair, Harry Boxall (Chichester). The accounts scrutineer, Kevin Breen (Chichester), was also returned for another year.

One other item of business was transacted and that was to modify the name of the Area Association's constitution. It had caused confusion as since its inception it has been referred to as the 'Rules' of the Association. The proposal to rename as 'Constitution and Rules...' was carried unanimously by those present. It was further amended to refer to WSBKA as an 'Area Association Member' of the British Beekeepers' Association.



#### Chairman's Chat



Chairman, Roger Patterson writes for the County News.

n March, I did a bit of travelling and, as is often the case in spring, the trees and plants varied considerably in their advancement.

On one trip to North Wales, about 230 miles due north west, I noticed trees got more and more advanced as I got further away from home, which I didn't expect,

bearing in mind what I had heard about the weather in that area a couple of weeks earlier. Flowers such as daffodils and primroses were further ahead than ours, one roundabout being bright yellow with dandelions and several banks at the roadside covered in lesser celandines. Of these, it's only the latter two that are of any use





to honey bees, but that doesn't matter, as it shows a trend.

One advantage of keeping bees is that it brings the observant beekeeper closer to the natural world, an example being that I am writing this on 27<sup>th</sup> March, when during a warm spell in the afternoon, I saw several bumblebees, a few hover flies, a lovely brimstone butterfly and a red admiral. All of this when I was topping a leylandii hedge belonging to a neighbour, so my bees aren't so hovered in.

That's a reminder that if you haven't trimmed back vegetation, then do it soon, otherwise you will be short of time to do it, as the temperatures rise and you concentrate on your bees.

There is a reminder of the auction elsewhere. If you are new to the craft, please chat to me about any lots you might be interested in and if you are likely to buy bees, I will be inspecting them beforehand, so you can see what you might bid on. If you don't buy anything, it doesn't matter, as the day is good for speaking to other beekeepers.



# **National Dandelion Day**

## Who knew? The UK celebrates 'National Dandelion Day' on Wednesday 5<sup>th</sup> April this year.



The Dandelion, much loved by the honey bee amongst others for its nectar, is a tap-rooted, perennial, herbaceous plant, native to the temperate areas of the Northern Hemisphere. Once dandelion flowers dry off, dropping petals and stamens, it opens into a spherical shape. Once the seeds are mature, they fly off with the help of fluffy parachute-like structures attached to their tips. The wind disperses the seeds — they are capable of travelling very large distances.

It is believed that the dandelion evolved around 30 million years ago in the Eurasian region. Our prehistoric ancestors

were well aware that the plant was edible and brimmed with medicinal properties. The properties of the plant were known to Egyptians, Greeks, Chinese and Romans. It was popular in America for its edible uses and in China for its medicinal benefits.

Raw dandelion greens are rich in calcium, potassium, iron, manganese, and various vitamins. The flower can also be used to produce a yellow dye.
