

# Chairman's Chat



Chairman, Roger Patterson writes for the County News.

t Wisborough Green BKA we have recently had beekeepers from four other BKAs visit us, as they wanted to see how we operate our teaching apiary. They were individuals from Horley, Eastbourne and Nuneaton BKAs and a group of about a dozen from our neighbours, Petersfield BKA. In my book 'The Teaching Apiary: A Brilliant Resource', I mention there are many different ways that BKAs teach their members. These four were quite varied too, resulting in some interesting and hopefully fruitful discussion.

I regularly speak to beekeepers, mainly from outside West Sussex, who are frustrated their BKAs only allow the first year beginners into the teaching apiary, after that, they are on their own. At first glance, this isn't sensible, but very often there are good reasons, such as limited space, small number of colonies or shortage of demonstrators. It's easy to criticise without knowing the situation.

Surprisingly, in 60 years of beekeeping, I have never visited Central Sussex or Worthing apiaries, and Chichester only once. We are all Divisions of WSBKA and there is an open invitation to visit other Divisions in the WSBKA newsletter, so why doesn't it happen? Is it because beekeepers don't see the relevance of WSBKA? Do they think parochially? Don't they read the newsletter? Are they busy? Is it too far? Are they concerned they won't know anyone? Are they waiting for a personal invitation? I don't know the answer, probably because there may be several. All I know is that by visiting others, it is possible to pick up information that may help you understand and care for your bees better, so perhaps we are missing an opportunity or two. I am regularly invited to demonstrate outside West Sussex and I find I am always learning something new.

I started writing this to tell you a little about what has happened at Wisborough Green BKA, but as I got further into it, ideas have developed. I don't wish to push anyone into doing something they would rather not, but I am one of the few members who can remember our County Field Days (How many others can?).

They were run by the County Beekeeping Instructor (CBI), Harry Thompson, at Kingsham Farm Apiary, just off the Chichester by-pass. These were monthly events, held on Saturday afternoons. As a modern

version, could we not ask each Division (there are four) to host a 'county field day' as one of their meetings, say, April, May, June, July? There would be many benefits including a learning opportunity, seeing how others handle colonies, learning different management techniques and of course meeting other beekeepers. Rather than always being apiary based perhaps it could be an indoor event, such as honey extraction/processing or the recent WGBKA 'Making things with beeswax day'.

Again, whilst writing this, I have thought a bit further, such as the variation in soil types WSBKA members keep their bees on - clay, gravel, chalk, sand, etc. that can show variations in the way bees are managed only a short distance away. Perhaps this topic could be a discussion point for WSBKA, but if you have any ideas, then chat to your BKA.

**Varroa** control options: A talk and discussion regarding authorised varroacides and biotechnical methods for the management of *Varroa* infestation.

**The Asian hornet**, *Vespa velutina*: The current situation and best advice on detection, trapping and reporting.

**Specimen brood frames:** A chance to see and handle brood frames exhibiting the signs of the notifiable diseases, American Foul Brood (AFB) & European Foul Brood (EFB). Also, frames with minor brood disorders such as chalkbrood and sacbrood that may be confused with AFB and EFB.

**Pest and disease inspection techniques:** This session, in the WG teaching apiary, will demonstrate the methods used by Bee Inspectors in their work, looking for notifiable exotic pests, notifiable honey bee disease and minor brood disorders.

Please bring clean protective clothing for the session at the apiary.

The two notifiable Foul Brood diseases are uncommon and the vast majority of beekeepers will never see them in a colony. That is the danger, because beekeepers are not looking for them and may not recognise them. This event gives the opportunity of seeing notifiable diseases in the comb, therefore we encourage attendance.

Drinks available during the day. Please bring a packed lunch. There is only one small, local shop in Ifold.

There is limited parking at the hall. If possible please share transport.

The cost of the day is £10. <u>Booking is essential</u>. The total number will be restricted to 60 participants allocated on a first come, first served basis. <u>Because of the low cost no refunds will be given</u>.

# Asian hornet Update



The NBU has reported two further sightings of the Asian hornet in the South East of England during May.

The first was on 18<sup>th</sup> near Ashford in Kent. This has been identified as a single hornet incursion.

The second was on 28<sup>th</sup> in Canterbury and this is being investigated.

Remember to report sightings of *Vespa velutina* using the 'Asian hornet Watch' app or the online reporting form.
